H.Res. 796 – Rule providing for consideration of House Amendment to Senate Amendment to H.R. 1625 – Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2018 (Rep. Frelinghuysen – Appropriations) (One hour of debate). The Rules Committee has made in order a motion offered by the Chair of the Committee on Appropriations or his designee that the House concur in the Senate amendment with an amendment to H.R. 1625 and provides for one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the Chair and Ranking Member of the Committee on Appropriations. The Rule waives all points of order against the motion.

The Rules Committee rejected a motion by Mr. Polis of Colorado to make in order and provide the appropriate waivers to amendments en bloc: amendment #7 offered by Rep. Polis which prohibits the federal government from spending DOJ funds to interfere with state marijuana laws; amendment #8 offered by Rep. Polis which reduces defense spending by one percent, excluding health and personnel accounts; and amendment #9 offered by Rep. Polis which inserts the text of Rep. Roybal-Allard’s bill **H.R. 3440** – Dream Act of 2017. **Members are urged to VOTE NO.**

House Amendment to Senate Amendment to H.R. 1625 – Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2018 (Rep. Frelinghuysen – Appropriations) (One hour of debate). This Omnibus package contains funding for federal agencies under all twelve Appropriations subcommittees for the remainder of Fiscal Year 2018.

This Omnibus appropriates \$1.21 trillion in base discretionary budget authority and \$78 billion in Overseas Contingency Operations (OCO) funding, and is consistent with the higher discretionary spending caps included in the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018. The Defense Appropriations bill sees a 14% increase over FY17, while the remaining eleven appropriations bills see an aggregate 12% increase. On immigration and the border: no funding is provided for additional detention beds or ICE deportation agents, \$1.6 billion is provided for border security – down from the \$25 billion request for a border wall, and no defunding of sanctuary cities. Unfortunately Republicans did not allow inclusion of protection for Dreamers.

H.R. 4061— Financial Stability Oversight Council Improvement Act (Rep. Ross – Financial Services) (One hour of debate). This measure would change the procedures that federal regulators follow for determining which nonbank financial institutions should be designated by the Financial Stability Oversight Council (FSOC) as systemically important financial institutions (SIFIs) and subject to heightened supervision due to their systemic risk. For example, the bill would increase the frequency and complexity of studies, reviews, and meetings that must be completed before the FSOC can designate a nonbank company as a SIFI. The bill also would allow companies to contest existing SIFI designations on the basis of the new criteria and procedures in addition to the current appeals process provided under Dodd-Frank. The Obama Administration opposed the bill last Congress.

The Rule, which was adopted last week, provides for one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the Committee on Financial Services.
