The GOP Leadership has announced the following schedule for Thursday, March 16: The House will meet at 12:00 p.m. for legislative business. The House is expected to consider [H.R. 1181](#) – Veterans 2nd Amendment Protection Act (Rep. Roe – Veterans' Affairs) (Subject to a Rule) and [H.R. 1259](#) – VA Accountability First Act of 2017 (Rep. Roe – Veterans' Affairs) (Subject to a Rule). The House is also expected to begin consideration of [H.R. 1367](#) – To improve the authority of the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to hire and retain physicians and other employees of the Department of Veterans Affairs, and for other purposes (Rep. Wenstrup – Veterans' Affairs) (Subject to a Rule).
