H.Res. 229 – Rule providing for consideration of H.R. 1430 – Honest and Open New EPA Science Treatment Act of 2017 (Rep. Smith (TX) – Science, Space, and Technology) (One hour of debate). The Rules Committee has recommended a closed Rule that provides for one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the Chair and Ranking Member of the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology. The Rule allows one motion to recommit and waives all points of order against the legislation. **Members are urged to VOTE NO.**

H.Res. 230 – Rule providing for consideration of S.J.Res. 34 – Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Federal Communications Commission relating to Protecting the Privacy of Customers of Broadband and Other Telecommunications Services (Sen. Flake – Energy and Commerce) (One hour of debate). The Rules Committee has recommended a closed Rule that provides for one hour of general debate equally divided and controlled by the Chair and Ranking Member of the Committee on Energy and Commerce. The Rule allows one motion to commit and waives all points of order against the legislation. **Members are urged to VOTE NO.**

S.J.Res. 34 – Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Federal Communications Commission relating to Protecting the Privacy of Customers of Broadband and Other Telecommunications Services (Sen. Flake – Energy and Commerce) (One hour of debate). The resolution disapproves of the Federal Communications Commission’s (FCCs) “Protecting the Privacy of Customers of Broadband and Other Telecommunications Service” rule. The rule ensures the privacy of consumers by requiring customer consent for Internet Service Providers (ISPs) to use, share, or sell customer’s personal information, including personal internet browsing histories.

House Republicans are bringing this Joint Resolution to the Floor under the Congressional Review Act (CRA) in order to bypass the sixty vote threshold in the Senate and block any substantially similar future regulation. Despite repeated promises of governing through regular order, this Joint Resolution is just another example of the empty promises made by the Republican Majority.

The House is also expected to begin consideration of **H.R. 1431** – EPA Science Advisory Board Reform Act of 2017 (Rep. Lucas – Science, Space, and Technology) (Subject to a Rule).
