[H.Res. 354](#) – Condemning the violence against peaceful protesters outside the Turkish Ambassador's residence on May 16, 2017, and calling for the perpetrators to be brought to justice and measures to be taken to prevent similar incidents in the future, as amended (Rep. Royce – Foreign Affairs)
2. [H.R. 390](#) – Iraq and Syria Genocide Emergency Relief and Accountability Act of 2017, as amended (Rep. Smith (NJ) – Foreign Affairs)
3. [H.Res. 355](#) – Condemning in the strongest terms the terrorist attacks in Manchester, United Kingdom, on May 22, 2017, expressing heartfelt condolences, and reaffirming unwavering support for the special relationship between our peoples and nations in the wake of these attacks (Rep. Meeks – Foreign Affairs)

The House is expected to consider [H.R. 2213](#) – Anti-Border Corruption Reauthorization Act of 2017 (Rep. McSally – Homeland Security) (Subject to a Rule). The House is also expected to consider [H.Con.Res. 33](#) – Designating the George C. Marshall Museum and George C. Marshall Research Library in Lexington, Virginia, as the National George C. Marshall Museum and Library (Rep. Goodlatte – Education and the Workforce) – under suspension of the Rules and begin consideration of [H.R. 10](#) – Financial CHOICE Act of 2017 (Rep. Hensarling – Financial Services) (Subject to a Rule).
